Physical Activity Environment Glossary

Active living: Integration of physical activity into everyday routines such as biking to work.

Census block group: Predefined spatial unit based on division of census tracts that can be used to assess the physical activity environment.

Circular buffer: Spatial unit that can be defined by a project team by selecting a point of interest and a radius around the point to assess the physical activity environment.

Community design: Design of a neighborhood or community with common metrics including density of people or residences and mix of land uses.

Environmental observation (audit): Method of measuring the physical activity environment through systematic observation by trained research staff and/or trained community stakeholders.

Geocoding: Process of converting addresses into geocoordinates.

Geographic Information System (GIS): Software system used for integrating and analyzing spatial and geographic data.

Land use mix: Measure of the diversity of destinations across an area, such as residential and commercial locations.



Macro-scale attributes: Attributes that describe the layout of a community.

Micro-scale attributes: Attributes within a setting.

Neighborhood walkability: Measure of how friendly an area is for walking.

Physical Activity Environment: For the purpose of these learning modules, the physical activity environment refers to the physical (built and natural) and social environment features that can support or inhibit physical activity.

Questionnaire: Method of measuring the physical activity environment using participant-report and proxy-report tools.

Residential density: Measure of the extent that land is occupied by either people or development.

Street connectivity: Directness of links and the density of connections in a transportation system.

Street network buffer: Spatial unit that can be defined by a project team by selecting a point of interest and a specified distance along the street network to assess the physical activity environment.

Streetscape: Features within a street segment or block and intersection.

Transportation system: Layout of streets.
